Welcome to Sunday School at STSA! Here at STSA we LOVE kids and have programs for children in preschool to high school. We're so happy you found us and we hope to share with you a little about what we are doing to help our kids and youth grow closer to God.

At STSA, our mission is to bring our ancient faith to a modern world. What that means for our Sunday School program is that everything we do for kids and youth is aimed at **bringing an ancient faith to our kids' modern world**. With that big picture in mind, we broke down this mission into three realistic goals:

We want all our kids and youth to . . .

1. be rooted and grounded in the love of Christ
2. experience the beauty and relevance of the Orthodox church
3. be fully engaged in the life of the church for their entire lives.

We focus all our prayers and efforts on these goals for our kids. It's only by the grace of God that He will accomplish this in our kids, but we must be faithful to do what He's called us to do.

He has called us, the parents, to be the primary educators of our children's spiritual lives and, as daunting as that may seem, take comfort in knowing that your church family is here to support and encourage you.

Our vision for Sunday School at STSA has always been based on the fact that **YOU, THE PARENT, are the most influential person in your child's life**--not their peers, their school teachers or even their Sunday School teachers. We, as Sunday School teachers and volunteers, can't out-teach what you teach at home. We simply don't have enough time with your kids. Our lessons are meant to plant seeds that are daily nurtured by you, the parents. We are here to support and encourage you as you fulfill your highest calling—the spiritual education of your children.

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OVERVIEW

Here at STSA we LOVE kids and have programs for preschoolers to high schoolers.



Our preschool program, **Tim's Tots**, is a child's wonderful introduction to Sunday School. We use an early childhood curriculum to teach relevant Bible truths. Each lesson teaches engaging Bible stories that transfer to true life application. Kids love the interactive lessons, fun Bible adventures, songs and stories. We teach basic Orthodox concepts using a Turtle Time stories which were written just for our little ones.



The next older group is referred to as Kids at The Well and is designed for children in elementary school. Lessons incorporate music, comedy, videos, saint stories, Orthodox concepts and the Bible in a unique way to spark the discovery and creativity in the heart of each child. The curriculum is designed to shape identity through planting these truths in the heart of every elementary-aged child: I can trust God no matter what, I need to make wise choices, I should treat others the way I want to be treated.



Our Middle and High Schoolers make up The Wave, a Sunday School program that is aimed at raising the next generation of Christian leaders who bring an ancient faith to their modern world. The Wave is where we build up our teens to become the tidal wave that will turn our world upside down with the love of Christ! Lessons are aimed at equipping your teen for the amazing adventure that God has called them to live out.

RESOURCES EXPLAINED

How do we help our kids achieve these three long-term goals from the time they are toddlers to the time they graduate high school? First, we look at what is age-appropriate for each phase of a child's life so we can be realistic with our expectations.

With age-appropriate expectations and our goals in mind, we developed two sets of resources for parents: Phase Guides and Milestones.

- **Phase Guides** are one-page guides for each year in a child's life that helps parents understand how best to teach and communicate spiritual principles to their child at this phase.*
- **Milestones** are short-term goals that our kids can work toward at each phase in their spiritual development. Milestones are not meant to be a checklist but are aimed at providing parents a suggestion of what to focus on teaching them at that age.

You'll find phase guides and milestones for each age in the pages that follow. We hope these resources will be a blessing to you and your family!

TWO-YEAR-OLD

THE PHASE WHEN NOBODY'S ON TIME, EVERYTHING'S A MESS, AND ONE EAGER TODDLER WILL INSIST, "I CAN DO IT."

EMBRACE

PHYSICAL NEEDS

Your two-year-old's changing ability is a crisis for you, and for them. This is a season filled with uncertainty, imperfection, and even failure as they struggle to keep up with all their newly developing skills. The way you consistently meet their needs, engage their senses, and provide discipline will help them develop confidence.

TEACH

SO THEY WILL KNOW GOD IS REAL

Your two-year-old listens to your words. So this phase is the perfect time to teach them about the reality of God by talking, singing, and praying together with your toddler. Begin by simply incorporating faith into your daily routines. Pray before meals. Show them that God is real and a real part of your daily lives.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Teach them that they are part of church—God's family. Encourage them to participate in the Liturgy as much as possible. Teach the sign of the cross. Name the saints depicted in icons. Explain the actions seen in Liturgy (going around the church with censer, kiss of peace, kneeling, etc.) Talk to them about the Gospel.

MAKE THE MOST OF EVERYDAY MOMENTS

EMBRACE

PHYSICAL NEEDS

Life for your three-year-old can be confusing. It's okay to throw a ball, but not a rock. You can hug your friend, but not squeeze his neck. Your three-year-old is learning the rules for life and encountering some necessary discipline. The way you consistently meet their needs, engage their senses, and provide discipline will help them develop self-control.

TEACH

SO THEY WILL KNOW GOD IS REAL

Your three-year-old has many questions. Some might be about creation, heaven, church, & the Bible and some of their questions might already be hard to answer. Don't panic. Just like other topics, answer faith questions, as simply as possible. If they need to ask more, they will. At this phase, the goal is help them know that God is real and that He loves them.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Talk to them about what they see in Liturgy. Teach them easy Liturgy responses like "Lord have mercy." Teach them simple prayers like the Lord's Prayer. Pray before meals & at bedtime. Talk to them about the Gospel.

The way you consistently meet their needs, engage their senses, and provide discipline will help them develop self-control.

TEACH

SO THEY WILL KNOW GOD IS REAL

Your four-year-old has many questions and some are difficult to answer. Don't panic. Just like other topics, answer faith questions, as simply as possible. If they need to ask more, they will. Your goal at this phase is to make sure they know God is real and He loves them.

THREE-YEAR OLD MILESTONES

At this age, we want children to know that God is real and living. Our goal is to have each child learn how to make the sign of the cross and memorize the Lord's Prayer. When they pray in the morning, at bedtime and before meals and then also during Liturgy, it will help them realize that the God they talk to at home is the same God we all worship in Liturgy and that He is real, alive and loves them. Here are a few goals to work on during these years.

FOUR-YEAR OLD MILESTONES

At this age, we want children to know that God is real and living. We also want to begin to help them feel connected to the Body of Christ and to begin to encourage knowledge of their faith. Young kids are quick to learn to song so we will leverage the beauty of liturgical hymns to help them grow in their faith. Encourage your kids to learn to sing the Trisagion and the Amen, Amen, Amen response during Liturgy.

KINDERGARTEN

THE PHASE WHEN UNFILTERED WORDS MAKE YOU LAUGH, SCHOOL DROP-OFF MAKES YOU CRY, AND LIFE BECOMES A STAGE WHERE YOUR KID SHOUTS, "LOOK AT ME!"

ENCOURAGE

SO THEY LEARN TO TRUST GOD

School is a crisis. Your now-elementary-school kid is adjusting to big changes, whether it's bus rides or lunch lines or new routines. But the stress of change can also be a platform for discovery and growth. The way you answer their questions, listen to their stories, and show up consistently will help them improve their abilities.

TEACH

SO THEY LEARN THAT GOD IS REAL

Your kindergartner is quickly learning the habits and routines that make your family work. Make church a priority, but don't let it be the only time you talk about faith. Talk about God as you go about your day. Incorporate Him in the reality of day-to-day life so they know He is real.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Teach them about the saints and their lives. Encourage them to participate in the Liturgical responses such as the Trisagion hymn and Amen, Amen, Amen. Have them draw or color what they see and hear at church. Point out all the different ways we use our senses in Liturgy. Have them listen to the readings talk to them about the Gospel.

SHOW

YOUR INTEREST

Your first grader's schedule may be picking up pace—from bus rides to recreational sports to after-school programs. But with all the increasing opportunities to try new things, don't miss what your first grader needs most. The way you answer their questions, listen to their stories, and show up consistently will help them improve their abilities.

TEACH

SPIRITUAL PRACTICES SO THEY GROW IN CHRIST

Your first grader may be starting to read and enjoy books. So, this is a great year to purchase a kid's Bible. Read the Bible to them. Teach them the basics about the Bible—Old, New Testaments, Table of Contents, Chapter (big number)/Verse (small number), etc. Introduce them to the Sacrament of Confession and encourage them to try it.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Encourage them to learn liturgical hymns so they can engage in Liturgy. Challenge them to read their Bible and pray daily. Have them listen to the readings. Talk to them about the Gospel. SHOW

YOUR INTEREST

Your second grader is becoming increasingly self-aware—aware of their thoughts, aware of their abilities, and very aware of their mistakes. Even though your kid is gaining independence in some wonderful ways, don't miss the internal struggle of this phase. The way you answer questions, listen to their stories, and show up consistently will help you encourage their efforts.

TEACH

SPIRITUAL PRACTICES SO THEY GROW IN CHRIST

Your second grader may be starting to enjoy reading. So, this is a great year to encourage skills that will help them enjoy reading the Bible. Teach them the basics about the Bible—Old, New Testaments, Table of Contents, Chapter (big number)/Verse (small number), etc. Encourage them to read the Bible and pray daily. Encourage regular participation in the Sacrament of Confession.

ENGAGE

Encourage them to learn liturgical hymns so they can participate in Liturgy. Have them listen to the readings. Talk to them about the Gospel. Have them follow along with the Liturgy on the screen or in a book. Encourage them to participate in the Sacrament of Communion weekly and introduce them to the Sacrament of Confession.

Your third grader is keen for comparison. They love to compare movies, sports, teams, ice cream flavors . . . and people. This tendency often leaves kids wondering just how well they measure up. The way you answer their questions, listen to their stories, and show up consistently will help you encourage their efforts.

TEACH

SPIRITUAL PRACTICES SO THEY
GROW IN CHRIST

As your third grader gains more independence, this is a great year to encourage quiet time. Help them develop a habit of spending time alone with God in prayer and His Word. Teach them how to pray using the Book of Hours and to start memorizing some simple Psalms, like Psalm 1. Read the same book of the Bible together and share your thoughts with each other. Encourage them to participate in the Sacrament of Confession and associate it with a fun event afterward so they learn to look forward to this as a great blessing.

FOURTH GRADE

THE PHASE WHEN FRIENDS ARE BEST FRIENDS, GAMES ARE FOR COMPETITION, AND YOUR CONFIDENT KID WILL INSIST, "I'VE GOT THIS."

BUILD

THEIR CHURCH COMMUNITY

Your fourth grader can understand different points of view, empathize with others, and negotiate like a champ. That means one thing: Your influence is shifting. Your kid still needs you, but they are beginning to need you in a different way. If you want to engage their interests, then include peers, coach relational skills, and help your kid develop healthy friendships. Start investing in building your child's community at church. Consider hosting a leisure group to get your kids' friends together so they can develop deeper friendships.

TEACH

SPIRITUAL PRACTICES SO THEY GROW IN CHRIST

Fourth graders are often introspective and enjoy having some alone time. Leverage this new tendency to help them develop a habit of spending time alone with God reading His Word and praying. Continue having conversations about God at home. Encourage regular confession.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Explain the deeper meaning behind what they see in Liturgy (Father washes his hands to remind us to repent, we share stories about saints to inspire us to lead courageous lives for Christ, the censer is a symbol of the Virgin Mary, etc.). Encourage them to memorize a Psalm from the Book of Hours and recite in church. Have them listen to the readings and follow along. Talk to them about the Gospel. Have them follow along with the Liturgy on the screen or in a book.

HAVE YOU READ ANYTHING IN THE BIBLE THAT MEANS A LOT TO YOU RIGHT NOW? (Talk about the Bible.)

I SEE YOU'RE LEARNING ABOUT ... THIS MONTH. WHY IS THAT IMPORTANT? ((Make sure you're receiving Sunday School communications to stay in the loop about Sunday School lessons and to continue the conversation all week long.)

DID YOU KNOW THAT MOST OF THE LITURGY IS TAKEN FROM THE BIBLE? (Connect the dots between Liturgy and the Bible to give a bigger context.)

Impress them [the commands of the Lord] on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." Deuteronomy 6:7

MORNING TIME

Be a coach. Model and encourage them to spend time alone with God each morning.

DRIVE TIME

Be a friend. Interpret life during informal conversation as you travel.

BUILD

THEIR CHURCH COMMUNITY

Your fifth grader can understand different points of view, empathize with others, and negotiate like a champ. That means one thing: Your influence is shifting. Your kid still needs you, but they are beginning to need you in a different way. If you want to engage their interests, then include peers, coach relational skills, and help your kid develop healthy friendships. Invest in building your child's community at church. Consider hosting a leisure group to get your kids' friends together so they can develop deeper friendships. Join neighborhood & life groups so your kids will build deeper friendships with others from church.

TEACH

SPIRITUAL PRACTICES SO THEY GROW IN CHRIST

Help them develop a habit of spending time alone with God. Continue having conversations about God at home. Encourage them to pray and read their Bible daily. Find a devotional for preteens. Encourage regular confession.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY WILL LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Explain the deeper meaning behind what they see in Liturgy (Father washes his hands to remind us to repent, we share stories about saints to inspire us to lead lives for Christ, the censer is a symbol of the Virgin Mary, etc.). K-1ST GRADE MILESTONES

At this age, we want children to develop a personal faith and personal sense of "awe" seeing God work in their lives. We know the best way to help them experience God in their lives is to help them develop spiritual disciplines that allow them to connect with Him and His Body, the church. Children in K-1st grade become better at reading and can now begin to develop lifelong spiritual disciplines such as daily Bible reading and prayer, regular confession and weekly communion. Encourage your kids to learn the order of the Books of the Bible and Psalm 23 by heart.

2ND - 3RD GRADE MILESTONES

At this age, we want kids to begin to have to have religious knowledge of their faith and to feel connected to the Body of Christ. Encourage your kids to commit these to heart.

SIXTH GRADE

THE PHASE WHEN THERE'S NEVER ENOUGH GROCERIES, TOO MANY HORMONES, AND A DRAMATIC KID THAT NEEDS SOMEONE TO PROVE, "WHO CARES."

PROVE

YOUR LOVE & TRUST

Sixth grade is a crisis. For many, this is the first year of middle school, which means an entirely new social context: lockers, health class, and questions about dating. Regardless of their particular school, every sixth grader has an increased social and self-awareness. When you consistently prove your love and trust through this sometimes-turbulent season, you help them gain stability. When they push, prove you can't be pushed away. When they change, prove you will love them consistently. When they break your trust, prove you are someone who can be trusted.

BUILD

THEIR CHURCH COMMUNITY & SPIRITUAL PRACTICES

Your sixth grader needs consistent, positive friends and mentors—now more than ever before. Encourage them to regularly attend Liturgy and Sunday School so they don't miss out on valuable opportunities to build friendships at church. Help them strengthen their church relationships and continue to engage them in conversations about faith at home. Talk to them about their quiet time and share your quiet time thoughts with them. Solidify the habit of daily prayer, Bible reading, weekly communion and regular confession.

ENGAGE

THEM IN LITURGY SO THEY LOVE GOD'S FAMILY

Encourage them to read the Sunday readings in advance. Have them follow along with the Liturgy on the screen or in a book. Your seventh grader is in a season of personal discovery. Not everyone makes the team. Interests and abilities change. Long-accepted values can come into question. On top of all that, this phase is a time of heightened self-awareness. When you consistently affirm them through this sometimes-turbulent season, you help them gain stability. Help them discover their talents so they can find their place in the Body of Christ. Encourage them to volunteer at church and in the community. Talk about your faith and live it out daily through prayer—personal prayer and using the Book of Hours, Bible reading and discussion and acts of service. Teach them that their faith encompasses their whole life—not just Sundays.

Encourage them to start or maintain healthy spiritual practices—daily prayer, Bible reading, regular attendance in Liturgy and Sunday School and regular confession. Encourage Sunday School and jump on opportunities for them to attend church retreats and activities as these are pivotal chances for them to build lasting friendships within their church community.

SO THEY GAIN STABILITY

Your eighth grader is cool. No longer at the mercy of an uncontrollable emotional outburst, they are increasingly able to self-regulate their actions, emotions, and activities. But, this emerging sense of control creates a new kind of tension for your teenager to resolve. Whenever possible, give options so they have some freedom to choose. When you consistently affirm them through this sometimes-turbulent season, you help them gain stability. Eighth graders actually want to have adult conversations sometimes so be available.

DISCOVER TALENTS

Help them explore their talents so they can find their place in the Body of Christ. Encourage them to volunteer in church and in the community. Talk about your faith and live it out daily through prayer—personal prayer and using the Book of Hours, Bible reading and discussion and acts of service. High school means higher stakes. Many freshmen spend this year redefining who they thought they were or what they thought their future would be. Pay attention. Ask questions. This is a significant year. Ninth grade means increased demands for personal responsibility. Grades begin to count toward future college admission. By the end of this year, your teenager will have a more stable sense of who they are. The greatest thing you can do in this phase is to continually rediscover who they are becoming and know where they are finding acceptance. Teach them that their faith encompasses their whole life—not just Sundays—and is an integral part of their identity. Talk about your faith and show them how you live it out daily. Continue to encourage regular spiritual practices—personal prayer, praying using the Book of Hours, Bible reading, confession and communion.

AS THEY GROW IN INDEPENDENCE

Your tenth grader feels comfortable navigating the hallways of high school, and they are ready for more. Tenth graders are expanding their life experience. They will push the limits. They might even rebel a little—even though you never did. So guide them to clarify their values carefully. They still need you more than they will say. They still need boundaries but unless the boundaries make sense to them they won't stay within them. Just remember when you "debate" (loudly) boundaries with a tenth grader, stay in the present. They aren't challenging what you both want ten years from now, they just need you to understand what they need right now. Show them what it means to base their entire life on Christ, not just their Sunday mornings. Continue to encourage regular spiritual practices—personal prayer, prayer with the Book of Hours, Bible reading, confession and communion. Show them how their daily spiritual practices are a means of connecting with God for guidance to make big and little life decisions.

In this phase when your tenth grader is asking, "Why should I believe?" the best thing you can give them is a consistent faith community where they can process their doubts and strengthen their relationship with God. Now that they've been volunteering for a few years, encourage them to identify their God-given spiritual gifts and to use them for His glory. This is the perfect age to recruit adult mentors into your teen's life who can speak truth into their lives and encourage them through these difficult years. Encourage them to regularly participate in Liturgy, Sunday School & church activities and retreats.

Your eleventh grader is ready to live the life they feel they were born to live—and they don't want to wait to get started. Two years is too long! Your junior is ready to do something, right now. Listen and guide them through this stressful year. What they really want is for you to trust them. They will be out of the house soon and you'll have to trust them. Let this be a practice year for both of you. Help them prove the ways they can be trusted, choose your battles wisely, and parent them in areas that seem to be most challenging for them personally. Junior year is filled with pressure and navigating all of it is your junior's major accomplishment. Show them what it means to base their entire life on Christ. Continue to encourage regular prayer—both personal prayers and using the Book of Hours, Bible reading, confession and communion. Share how your spiritual practices have aided you in your life decisions. Share a time when your distance from God ended up in poor decision-making.

PREPARE THEM FOR INDEPENDENCE

Graduation is a crisis—for both of you. Sure, it's exciting. It's a huge accomplishment. But something is about to change, and there's a good chance you aren't convinced they're ready. They might not be. And whether they seem to show it or not, your senior is probably just as concerned about that as you. You will probably feel urgency in these last 52 weeks. As a senior takes on more responsibility, they may also lean in relationally. They discover—especially late in the year—they need you a little bit more than they thought. All of a sudden, the decisions they face have very high stakes. You mobilize their potential when you help them prepare, as best as possible, for what's coming. Help them solidify their ability to make decisions based on their identity in Christ. Share your daily meditations with them and ask them to do the same. Encourage consistent spiritual practices.
